ALBERT EDWARD GALLATIN

Born in Kentucky in 1810; emigrated to Texas from Missouri in 1832; First sergeant, Second Regiment, Texas Volunteers, Second Company. Slightly wounded at San Jacinto. Captain of a company in Colonel Edwin Morehouse's regiment in January 1841, in an expedition against Indians on the upper Brazos River.¹

¹ Letter dated November 14, 1956 to Members of Brazos County Historical Survey Committee states, "Dear Texas Patriot: On May 22, 1956 an inquiry with reference to the grave of San Jacinto soldier, Albert Gallatin, was directed to your committee. Albert Gallatin was reported buried in Bickham Cemetery, three miles from Tabor, by his grandson, Lester Gallatin, of Baytown. Will your committee please verify this grave location and report it on the form provided sometime ago. As you know, funds are available for placing markers at the graves of the Texas War for Independence men. We are especially anxious to include this man and any others buried in your county. However, there is a likelihood that funds will be exhausted before the program is completed. Please let me suggest that if you have not done so, a story of this search be given to your paper.
