

Historical Rites Set Sunday

The Brazos County Historical Survey Committee will dedicate three historical markers Sunday. The sites include the Brazos River, the Bryan City Cemetery and the Carnegie Library.

The first will be at the Brazos River beginning at 1:30 p.m. on FM 60 two-tenths miles east of Jones Bridge. The Brazos was selected because it commemorates the influence that the state's largest river has had on its history, according to James L. Boone Jr., chairman of the survey committee.

60 where the marker is located is also part of the Brazos Travel Trail, designated by former Texas Governor John Connally.

John T. Duncan, former professor of history at Texas A&M University, will make the dedicatory speech. W. R. Vance, county judge, will accept for the county.

A. B. Syptak will dedicate the marker at the entrance of the Bryan City Cemetery at 2:45 p.m. The marker was provided by the Bryan Cemetery Association.

The marker commemorates the establishment of the cemetery more than 100 years ago, on June 13, 1868.

The Carnegie Public Library dedication will be at 3:30 p.m. in front of the old library building on Main Street. Mrs. Hazel Richardson will make the

dedication speech.

Chairman Boone said in case of inclement weather the dedications will be made at the new Bryan Public Library at 1:30 p.m. The survey committee will host a coffee at the new library after the dedications.

Committee members include Boone, Mrs. Richardson, Mrs. J. M. Nance Mrs. Emmette Wallace, Logan Wilson, Walter Carl Jones and Miss Lucy Harrison.

The committee is appointed by the county judge and terms run concurrently with his.

There are 13 historical markers in the county, including one for the county, according to Boone. The last dedication was in 1965 for Harvey Mitchell on the courthouse grounds, he said.
